

Iwami Kagura is a traditional form of folk theater from the Iwami region in Shimane Prefecture. It is a vibrant and energetic performance that combines dance, music, and storytelling to depict various myths, legends, and historical tales.

Today's program
—Iwami Kagura's Yamata-no-Orochi—
is one of the most attractive numbers.
This captivating performance tells the ancient myth of the fearsome eight-headed, eight-tailed serpent, Yamata-no-Orochi.



Story of Yamata-no-Orochi

One day the deity Susanoo came down to earth.

He saw an old couple and their daughter grieving. They told him that seven of their daughters had already become victims to an eight-headed Yamata-no-orochi, and it was coming to attack their last (8th) daughter named Kushinada-hime that night.

Susanoo decided to overcome the serpent to save their daughter, because she was very beautiful. He asked the old couple, if he slayed Yamata-no-Orochi, he will take their daughter to his wife. And they agreed.

Susanoo told the old folks to prepare eight tubs of strong sake and put them in the entrances of the eight- opening fence.


Monday, July 22

11:30 Arrival at Kasuien Minami.


Lunch featuring kaiseki cuisine.

Izumo Taisha Shrine

zumo Taisha is one of Japan's oldest and most important shrines, built in 1744 and designated as a national treasure.

The enshrined deity, Okuninushi-no-Kami, is associated with romance, marriage, relationships, medicine, and agriculture.

Unlike the typical Shinto prayer ritual of 2 bows, 2 claps, and 1 bow, Izumo Taisha uses 2 bows, 4 claps, and 1 bow.

Historically, Izumo Taisha was believed to be Japan's tallest building at 96 meters. In the Middle Ages, it was 46 meters, and today it stands at 24 meters, still impressing visitors with its majestic appearance.
